Dawley and Aqeduct Ward	Dawley Hamlets CP	Brookside Aqeduct Road	No. 1	1 Aqeduct Road, Aqeduct. A mid 19th century brick house. Two storeys, three bays. Windows with stone cills and lintels. Replacement windows in sash style. Tile gabled roof with gable and brick chimney stacks. Central pedimented doorcase with Victorian 4-panel door and stained-glass fanlight. A mid 19th century small red brick mission church with lancet windows with buff brick quoins and drip moulds. Built in 1851 by James Foster, ironmaster. T-shape, hall and cross wing. Clay tile gabled roof with overhanging eaves. The site was used as a scout headquarters in recent years. Refurbished into a private residence. Horsehay and Lightmoor Ward	Dawley Hamlets CP	Farm Lane	The Cottage	Stately and ornate two storey brick villa with polychromatic clay tile roof and corbelled chimney stacks set on the diagonal, sited in extensive grounds. Front elevation faces away from Farm Lane and has three gables; the southernmost one is a 2.5 storey front projection with what appears to be timber framed jettied upper floors over a brick and ashlar sandstone ground floor. The rear elevation facing Farm Lane has three gabled windows to the first floor and a gabled ground floor entry porch to the northeast end. Historical research from Victoria County History, Salop' states that 'Horsehay Cottage' was the most notable building dating from the late 19th-century. It was the home of H. C. Simpson, managing partner of the Horsehay Co., who enlarged an existing cottage into a large villa c. 1896 and added a handsome coach house and stable block south of the Cottage in the early 20th century. A late 18th century rubble stone and cottage with a hipped roof with an early brick gabled extension to the rear. Two storeys, casement windows and gable end chimney stack. Ground floor windows on west elevation have segmental arched stone heads. Modern two storey brick extension has been added to the rear. Gabled stepped roof with tall brick chimney stacks. Replacement windows, segmental arched brick heads. Principal entrances have glazed gabled porches. That to no. 14 an informal construction including highly decorative iron windows. Conservatory at the rear. Building is in the Horsehay and Spring Village Conservation Area. Originally three bay with central cantilevered bay facing southwest, gabled dormers to either side. Two-storey southeast wing with full height bay windows added in late-19th century. Steeply pitched roof with decorative bargeboarding, large moulded brick ridge chimney stacks, brick drip mould details to windows, steeply pitched roofs with decorative bargeboarding. A large single waterbody that was used in the 18th century to provide a head of water for the Horsehay Ironworks opened 1754-7 by Abraham Darby II. Dam wall of stone now rendered, with parapet wall in brick and raised in height including slag coping using waste from adjacent ironworks. A remnant of the stone and brick walls of the former ironworks also survives adjacent to the pool wall, including blocked doorway. Pool adapted from the mill pond at Horsehay Farm to serve the ironworks. The pool is now an open public space, managed by Telford and Wrekin Council, located within the Horsehay and Spring Village Conservation Area. A mid 19th century pair of brick cottages with a two-storey, four window range. Double pile plan with wing extensions. Flemish bond brickwork in dark red and buff. Gabled chimney stacks adorning a tiled roof. Window openings with keystone heads on south elevation. Window joinery replaced. Added to Telford & Wrekin Council's Register of Buildings of Local Interest in 1983. Horsehay and Lightmoor Ward	Dawley Hamlets CP	Horsehay - Bridge Road	Railway train shed	Railway train shed, now known as the Old Loco Shed, Bridge Road, Horsehay. Late 19th century brick train shed with round arched entrance and window openings between brick piers. Corrugated iron roof. Built in 1860, the shed was used as goods transhipment shed, for loading and storage of cargo. A track runs through the structure to allow trains to pass through. Modern signage has been erected and boards fitted to the windows. The building is still used by the Telford Heritage Steam Railway for storage and maintenance of locomotives. Located in the Horsehay and Spring Village Conservation Area. Added to Telford & Wrekin Council's Register of Buildings of Local Interest in 1983. An early 19th century brick and tile farmhouse built in 1817 with later 19th century extension. Brick house to left, three bay, two storey range with gabled and tiled roof with lateral chimney stacks, windows 6 over 6 Georgian sashes under segmental brick arches. To right later 19th century stuccoed extension of 3 bays with forward projecting gable, some larger paneled Victorian 2 over 2 sashes and cantilevered bay. Decorative central porch. Built in 1858 with Blue and yellow brick including chequer-board pattern to pediment and quoin details to pilasters. Gabled slate roof with coped pediments and decorative ridge tiles. Three bay fontage with two-light four-centered arch windows under stone drip moulds. Lower side wing in like style. The chapel served the primitive groups at Horsehay Potteries, Woodhouse Lane, Stoney Hill, and Coalmoor. A commemorative stone on the front gable reads 'PRIMITIVE METHODIST CHAPEL ERECTED 1858/ WHAT HATH GOD WROUGHT: 'It is still in use for worship as of 2024. Ground floor windows with drip mould brick detail. Glazed door at the main entrance with a porch. Banded fishscale tiled roof, modillion cornice and eaves and decorative polygonal chimney stacks at the ridge. Banded fishscale tiled roof, modillion cornice and eaves and decorative polygonal chimney stacks at the ridge.
